


NGOs and government work with tourism lodges to create performance payments

- Monitoring, recording and reporting on wildlife numbers and being rewarded for proven increases, or presence of wildlife in land set aside (e.g. corridors)
- Establish a national wildlife credit fund
- The fund pays communities directly for improvements in wildlife numbers or habitat
- based on agreed performance measures and evidence
- Impact investors buy credits or bonds in wildlife (e.g. rhinos) and receive payments for results, e.g. breeding

What are Wildlife Credits?



- If financial incentives reward communities for living with wildlife, then they will protect them.
- This value should be transferred to the people who are at the frontline of protecting nature.
- Payments are only made upon performance.
- Communities receive fair and efficient payments, and may invest these in salaries or infrastructure.
- The end result is less conflict between people and wildlife, less poaching and functional wildlife movement corridors.

Financial viability

- Potential to compensate for opportunity cost, linked to lease costs of land
- Startup seed funding is important
- Impact investors are important partners
- Transparency of returns on investments is feasible through viaible monitoring dashboards, remote imaging and cameras
- Wildlife credits should be ONE OF the livelihood and revenue streams of local communities part of a bundle of livelihood assets
